RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS



Confirmation

Confirmation is a service that, rightly or wrongly, has become much less common in the Church of England — perhaps following the reduction in church congregations generally. But what exactly is confirmation?

Jesus instituted two sacraments — baptism and communion. He intended baptism to signify initiation to the faith, and

communion as the ongoing practice that demonstrates and builds our relationship with Christ and with the church. As time went on, it became increasingly normal for children of Christian parents to be baptised as infants — but this did not guarantee a person's faith, salvation, or readiness to live a Christian life in maturity. As a consequence, confirmation evolved — a moment in which a bishop would pray and lay hands on such a person, praying that they might receive the Holy Spirit. After this they would also be able to receive communion.

So why would you want to be confirmed? The chief reason is to make a public declaration that this really is your faith — you are now owning the faith that your parents hoped you would embrace when you were baptised. It doesn't make you a Christian exactly, but confirms to you, and to others, that this really is your faith.

Prior to confirmation we normally give some confirmation classes. This is to explore together some of the basics of Christianity — the Lord's Prayer, the Creed and the Ten Commandments – and to build your understanding of what you're doing (and why) when taking communion. Classes should be informal, interesting, and, dare I say it?... fun.

If you would like to be confirmed, please **let me know!** There will be a service of confirmation for the deanery on **26th May, at 3pm in Aldeburgh church**, conducted by Bishop Mike. If you let me know your interest I can submit your name, and also arrange a few sessions of preparation. There is no upper age limit; the lower age limit is 'the age of reason' — can you think for yourself and express what you believe? Hoping you have a very happy Easter:

THEOLOGY CORNER



Reading Paul's Letters 2

Last month I spoke about how Paul's world had been transformed by his conversion from Judaism to Christianity, and he needed to work through deep theological thinking to replace the framework of Torah, temple, covenant etc. with a theology of the new covenant in Jesus.

In the theology that he produces one thing becomes abundantly clear — for Paul everything comes back to the cross. He is relentlessly focused on the cross. He refers to almost nothing else that Jesus said or did, but his

crucifixion and resurrection. Why so? Did he not know the other stories? Did he know them but not think them important?

I think it is clear that Paul did know the oral tradition around Jesus — he did know the stories. The gospels had not been written when he wrote, but on his conversion he immediately joined the community of Christians and, in a culture that was well used to storytelling and oral tradition, he would have heard faithful accounts of what Jesus said and did from eye-witnesses — and committed them to memory himself. Paul, however, was not there to tell again the Jesus story, but to interpret it — to 'go up the ladder of abstraction' towards universal principles, so that he might come down again into new, concrete practices. And all he needs for this is the cross. While Paul talks a lot about the theology of the cross, his overriding aim, most often, is to justify the inclusion of all people within the Christian church. This may seem surprising to us, as it is so commonplace that the Christian church is multinational, but it was a huge deal in the early decades of Christianity. Paul, in his vocation to preach to the gentiles, the non-Jews, was foremost in arguing that they did not need to take on any Jewish practice, but only the new Christian innovations communion and baptism. Again, this was not as obvious as we may think. Jesus was a practising Jew, and had not made any explicit references to breaking the food rules, or other parts of Jewish practice. On the other hand, Judaism had always recognised that the Lord was not only their God, but God of all: Christ's resurrection and ascension held all the clues that this wider reign had begun, and the phenomenon of the Holy Spirit being present in non-Jews also told them that this change was happening. So Saul, the scrupulous keeper of every Jewish law, became Paul, who argued furiously that there was no hierarchy within Christianity, and that for a gentile to undergo a Jewish practice like circumcision was a betrayal of the Christian faith, and a significant backward step.

Why was there even the temptation for Christianity to remain as a sect of Judaism? Chiefly, because Judaism had become a protected religion under Roman rule. It was like this: the Romans had found that most religions could be assimilated and syncretised with their own pantheon and religious practice. But Judaism had been extraordinarily stubborn at resisting. The Romans had shrugged their shoulders and pragmatically permitted Judaism to go on as it was (despite occasional tensions and uprisings, which culminated in AD70). While Christianity remained a Jewish sect, Christians could continue as a tolerated group. Once it became clear that it was now a majority gentile religion, it became visibly more of a threat to Rome: Christians not only refused to worship the Roman gods, but also refused to bow to Caesar, claiming instead that Jesus was Lord. That made them dangerous to the cohesion of the empire, and that got them persecuted at various points. Within such a context Paul doesn't pull his punches but continues to argue for the full inclusion of all people who believe, be they male or female, Jew or gentile, slave or free. And he argues against the temptation of some Jewish Christians to drift back towards the safer waters of Judaism — because they did in fact believe that Jesus had died and risen, that the Messiah had come and ushered in a new kingdom, and that only faith in him had any worth in their salvation.

This is the backdrop in which we need to read Paul's letters.

What I have said is far too little to get you going on these books of the Bible, in a way. I'm about half way through a 1600-page volume on Paul; when so much can be written, how can I hope that these few words will help much?

Perhaps you'll believe me that despite the formidable intellect, heavyweight theology and tendency to sidetracks, Paul was an extraordinary, unique man, whose love for the people of his churches really shines through in his writing, whose theological thinking was priceless and compelling, and whose love of God was worn with passion and a joyful grin.

The picture quality is not ideal, but it is such a vibrant and joyful image that I wanted to use it. It is notable that the people are worshipping in such a modest building. In contrast, church members in our benefice are weighed down with the maintenance of ancient and costly (albeit beautiful) buildings. That's how it is here, but the picture is a compelling reminder that it is people who make up the church, wherever they find themselves. Below is the information about the Lent Appeal from Bishops Martin and Mike.

BISHOPS' LENT APPEAL

The Bishops' Lent Appeal has been launched following visits by the bishops to Kagera in Tanzania, Africa, where the Diocese has had a link for nearly thirty years. Bishop Martin visited Kagera last year and Bishop Mike is returning from the region soon.

Bishop Martin says his presidency of the Suffolk Show this year further connects the Diocese to farmers abroad suffering from the impact of the climate crisis, and particularly the unpredictability of the seasons. "The challenge of changing climate, which we are experiencing in this country, is biting hard in impoverished rural areas like Kagera. The church there plays a key role in helping people adapt their farming methods to feed their families and communities. We can help by giving them funds to buy equipment and support agricultural projects as well as support the clergy and their villages with bikes and health care. Therefore, the bishops are focusing our Lent appeal on raising funds for the agriculture, health and church sectors in Kagera. This partnership is two-way – we learn a huge amount from our friends in Kagera about how to live as Christians in the midst of the world's challenges."

Bishop Mike said his trip, accompanied by curates, inspired the Diocese to strengthen ties: "I realised just how the global economic downturn compounding the climate crisis is affecting farmers, pastors and doctors in terms of costs and basic material needs. Lent is a time traditionally when we turn outwards in generosity towards others and even small amounts in UK terms go a long way to alleviate suffering in this area of the world."

DARSHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council's meeting on Tuesday 13th February was preceded by a public presentation on plans for the Cockfield Hall estate in Yoxford, which are expected to include the former Darsham Nurseries site. In his report, District Councillor Richard Smith mentioned Suffolk County Council's continued budget constraints,

but did highlight when questioned by Cllr Backhouse that a further £528,000 has been earmarked for arts organisations.

Cllr Green reported on recent flooding issues and has made contact with the relevant landowners and developers in an effort to resolve issues on The Street and The Wash. Cllr Butler has kindly agreed to assist in clearing a gully at The Wash. Cllr Stanley noted that there are now three vacant allotment plots and anyone interested should contact him.

Cllr Redgrave reported on the Northern Transport Forum meeting for Sizewell C, and councillors agreed that a complaint should be filed regarding the poor conduct of that meeting.

Cllr Davies is exploring the reinstatement of Footpath 8 together with Cllr Backhouse and the representatives of Cockfield Hall. The council would also like to extend its sincere thanks to Darsham House for the creation of a permissive footpath through its land to enable safe passage along a dangerous section of Westleton Road.

Councillors voted to object to three planning applications regarding the Cockfield Hall estate, and supported one application relating to Darsham House.

The next parish council meeting will take place on Tuesday 12th March at 7.00pm in Darsham Village Hall.

MIDDLETON WI NEWS

At our January meeting we were expecting to hear a talk about scams given by someone from the Suffolk Police but that had to be postponed. Instead that gave us a chance to concentrate on the



National Federation of WI's campaign resolutions for 2024. Out of fifty-eight resolutions submitted to the federation last autumn, four made the short list:

- 1. Dental Health Matters. There is a chronic shortage of NHS dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result.
- <u>2. Impacts of Poor Housing Conditions.</u> Poor housing can have a deleterious effect on human health, well-being, safety and quality of life.
- <u>3. Say No to Gambling Advertising.</u> Harm caused by excessive gambling is a global problem and some countries are already addressing this by banning advertising.
- 4. Improving Outcomes for Women in the Criminal Justice System. There is an urgent need to radically reform decision-making in respect of women, in particular those who are pregnant or have children, to reduce the number of women imprisoned for non-violent offences.

After each resolution was presented, we discussed it, asked questions, gave opinions and personal anecdotes and thoughts on what the WI could realistically do to campaign for these issues. We thought all of them worthy of government action but we had to choose just one of the four. Our WI voted for the improving

of women's outcomes in the criminal justice system. We shall know which resolution will be the 2024 Campaign in March after all the WIs have submitted their votes.

Our next meeting will be March 20th at 7.15pm in the village hall. The author Francesca Armour-Chelu will discuss "Pen to Published". All are welcome to join Lynne Venn us.



WESTLETON PARISH COUNCIL

On 5th February, the WPC gave a presentation to residents explaining the plans which it has drawn up together with EDF, SCC and ESDC in the B1125 Working Group (WG) for traffic calming measures in the village to mitigate the anticipated SZC construction traffic. EDF has projected that volumes will increase by up to 45% increase at peak times and this traffic will include LGVs up to 3.5 tonnes. Following the residents' meeting, WPC drafted a series of questions for residents to continue the consultation. The questionnaires (and associated plans) are available in the Village Hall Foyer and will can be completed until the end of March. Completed questionnaires can be posted in a box in the Foyer. The questionnaire can also be downloaded from the Westleton Parish Council and Westleton Village Hall websites. Your answers to the questions will guide the WPC's position at the next B1125 WG so please do take time to complete a questionnaire.

The Parish Council has started holding monthly surgeries in the Village Hall to provide an opportunity for residents to ask questions or raise matters with councillors outside of Parish Council meetings. The first was on 22nd January and was attended by several residents. The date of the next surgery is 18th March – 10.30-11.30am. The surgeries are attended by two councillors.

As mentioned in the February Fisherman, the Parish Council will be circulating a Housing Needs Survey at the end of March. The results will be used by Orwell Housing Association for a planning application for Affordable Housing in the village. We hope all residents will complete the survey. Importantly, it is also open to all people with a strong connection to the village; this could be through

family, work or current or previous residency in the village – and in particular people living outside of Westleton and who would choose to return if the right types of housing were available. Please keep a lookout for the survey which will be delivered to your houses in late March / early April and tell relevant others outside of the village of the survey.

In January, a diseased lime tree fell onto a car parked by the village pond. The District Council has since removed the tree debris and has removed the branches of another similarly diseased tree - although (strangely) not the trunk. However, the smashed car has not been moved. The WPC is aware that it is an eyesore and is working with the owner and our District Councillor to have it removed. We have also called on the District Council to fell the standing trunk as it is potentially dangerous.

With the ending of the Barrel Fair, the WPC has taken a decision to hold a village fete at some point during the summer months. WPC will set-up a group to plan/organise the fete. Please contact the Parish Clerk on westletonclerk@gmail.com if you would like to participate in the organising group.


