RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

In a brief break from Revd Tim's Ramblings, we welcome Revd Christine Brooks to share some thoughts.

It is almost ten years since I retired from full-time ministry and began to worship with you in Yoxmere. You have made me very welcome for which I am most grateful. It was a great sadness when I needed to admit recently that mobility problems were making it very difficult to continue to lead worship.

An enforced break, a rest, and help from many people including the NHS, has seen some improvement and I am now returning to lighter duties. There are several churches where I do not feel safe and cannot easily access, due to the path from the church to the nearest parking, or to difficult steps up or down into the church. I am grateful for all the support and concern and help you give me.

November is the month for remembrance — not just on 11th November, but All Saints and All Souls Days (1st and 2nd November) as well as St. Andrew at the end of the month. All Saints inspires us to think of those who have been famous examples of Christian faith and self-giving, while All Souls allows us a quieter moment to remember those close to us who may have died in the last year or relatively recently — giving thanks to God for their lives and their love.

Our world is in so much confusion and distress, and it is important we remember those caught up in these situations too, and the many who work for good. They may not always be headline news, but like ripples in a pond, their lives and examples often challenge us to look at our own lives and see what we can do to improve the lives of those around us.

THEOLOGY CORNER



The Prophets — Multi-media Messengers

Towards the end of Deuteronomy (the fifth book of the Bible), God gives Moses a significant 'carrot and stick' set of promises. Carrot: if the Israelites about to enter the promised land are faithful to their God and keep his laws, things will go well for them and they will have peace, abundance, and prosperity.

Stick: if they do not continue to follow the Lord they will suffer from death, disease, drought, dearth, danger, destruction, defeat, deportation, destitution, disgrace. It's a sobering list of consequences.

The history books which continue the story from there seem set on proving that these promises are true. During the reign of good kings there is indeed peace, abundance and prosperity. During the reign of bad kings all those Ds come true. But good and bad are not defined as we think of them now — leadership skills, hard work, networking etc. — it's all about whether you are faithful to the Lord and (consequently) have a strong moral compass.

As suggested last month, one of the key functions of prophets was to remind the kings and their people about the warnings in Deuteronomy, and that ethics and good leadership were all a part of being a faithful follower of the Lord.

The methods the prophets used to get attention were at times colourful and varied. Elijah announced a famine across Israel and then disappeared for three years, hiding in the wilderness, and fed by ravens (!) while a drought ensued. At the end of this time, he confronted King Ahab, and challenged him to gather the prophets of the false god Baal, and they had a sacrifice 'shoot out' on top of a mountain: which god would send down fire from heaven, Baal or the Lord?

Hosea married a prostitute as part of his prophecy (really!). Ezekiel drew Jerusalem on a clay tablet and then 'besieged' it over the course of days, putting up siege works and suchlike — all in a public place. He then had to lie on his side 'bearing' the sin of Israel and Judah for 330 days all told. Performance art is not a modern thing: Ezekiel was doing it 2500 years ago.

The book of Jonah is much the best known of the books of the prophets. If you had a Bible story book as a child you must have had the story of Jonah being swallowed by the whale. But what does it mean? And is it true? There are lots of different answers to these questions. Some people will tell you it's true. I've come to think that it is a story that conveys a truth, which is different.

The story is this: God tells Jonah to go to Nineveh, the capital of Assyria, to warn the people that if they do not repent, God will destroy them. Jonah does not want to go to Nineveh — that's the last place he would like to go. So he gets on a ship bound for Tarshish, in the other direction. God makes a storm blow up; Jonah knows that he is the cause of the threat to the ship, and suggests he should be thrown overboard to save the ship and all the crew. They do this, a 'big fish' swallows him, and the storm calms. Inside the fish, Jonah prays, and says sorry to God. Three days later, he is spat out again on dry land. He goes to Nineveh and preaches repentance... and the Ninevites believe him and turn to God! Jonah goes away and grumbles that God did not destroy Nineveh as he had promised.

Nineveh was the capital of Israel's feared enemy, Assyria. If you can imagine Jonah being sent to Berlin in 1939 you perhaps can imagine how much he did not want to go, and also how much he would resent God's mercy on the city. And this is the point of the story — that God is less partisan than his faithful might wish him to be. God loves all people, even the Ninevites.

So in this case it is not what Jonah says that is the message, but the story is the message.

Prophetic writings developed their own rich language of concepts, metaphors and ideas. Armies of locusts, vineyards, drunkenness and much more should not be taken at face value within the prophets. They have the sort of creative allusiveness of many of Bob Dylan's songs, like 'A hard rain's a-gonna fall'. There is lots of imagery, not all of which makes sense to you, but you may get the general meaning.

Between them the prophets offered a multi-media artistic, colourful cry from God to his people. It's a unique (and difficult) literature - which is worth reading, and reading about, to understand the full richness the Bible has to offer.

Minutes of meeting on 10th October 2023

Cllr Richard Smith reported on the problems preparing a SCC budget for the coming year. He then awarded a Suffolk County Councillor's Award certificate to Robin Leggate in recognition of his outstanding contribution to our community during his period serving on Darsham Parish Council.

Sizewell C representatives then gave a presentation on the ongoing and forecast work regarding the nuclear power station. Details of this will be available on the Darsham website.

There followed a discussion about Lionlink which is proposed to provide electricity links connecting offshore wind between the UK and the Netherlands. If the cable comes ashore at Southwold or Walberswick the underground cable will lie between Darsham and Westleton.

The CPR and defibrillator courses arranged by our Emergencies Officer Cllr Taylor were attended by about forty participants and were very well received. Our thanks to the presenters, Suffolk Accident Rescue Service, for an enjoyable and very informative course.

PLAYGROUND UPDATE

All the village were invited to an informal presentation at the Village Hall on Monday 9th October, at which we had approximately forty attendees, including children. Information with supporting diagrams and photos of the options regarding equipment choices from four different suppliers, including prices, were available for viewing. We all listened hard to what those who were interested enough to attend were saying - especially the younger ones, receiving useful feedback regarding equipment preferences etc.

Next stage is planning and grant funding applications.

News from Dunwich Heath

Autumn is very much here and making its presence known, with several misty mornings and the leaves all shades of red, brown, orange and yellow, though some trees are still catching up with the mild weather so far this autumn. The stags have been bellowing eerily and our winter migrant species have been popping up to show everyone that despite the time of year there is still plenty of wildlife to see! The bumper crop of berries on the trees has been a welcome find for all the migrants that have made the journey over, fieldfares and redwings the main beneficiaries.

In other news our ranger, Sam, is just about to make a start on the yearly heather scraping, an essential conservation task which removes patches of dead heather and vegetation, exposing the dormant seeds to light and rain. This rejuvenates the patches and ensures the entire heath does not age at the same rate and therefore die off in one go. Look out for Sam chugging along in the tractor, and maybe make a note of where the patches are, so that in the spring you can come back and see the first shoots pushing through the soil.

Looking ahead to what's on here over this month and the winter, our history talks covering the heath's past are on monthly, along with a series of talks on a variety of subjects, including the RNLI, bats and seals. More details on all the talks are on our website. We also have the brilliant DASH Astro team back this month for two nights of stargazing on the 17th and 18th, so make sure you book in for a fascinating evening under the stars.

At our September meeting we welcomed back Steve and Davene Everett, volunteer guides at RSPB Minsmere (who previously spoken to us about adders) to talk about "Minsmere Autumn and the Red Deer Rut". They illustrated their words with beautiful photos and videos, all their own work. Many insects are about with the bee wasps digging into the sand being one sign of the end of summer. Crickets, dragon flies, spiders, grasshoppers are about, food for egrets, sand martins and hobbies. There are many migrating birds, and many different breeds of duck and swan arrive to take over the scrape. Starlings in autumn and winter will give their air displays at dusk.

Autumn is a time for maintenance work. The reeds are cut and the waterways unchoked to give a clean edge so bitterns can fish. It is a time to repair and expand the hides if needed. Wild konick ponies will graze and keep the meadows under control. If there are storms, the beach side of reserve needs clearing of washed up rubbish which comes mainly from boats.

At the back of the reserve part of which was once Mount Pleasant Farm is where the red deer are found. Vans are used for the deer safaris on which you may also see sparrow hawks, red head partridges, kestrels, buzzards and stone curlews. With red deer there are stags (males) and hinds (females). The stags' antlers have points which increase in number as they age, 12 points make a Royal, 14 points make an Imperial and 16 points make a Monarch. The antlers which are made of bone are shed in the spring when new ones will start to grow. In the rutting season stags use their antlers to attract the hinds and to challenge their rivals. They also

bellow (roar) loudly to show off. The stags like to thrash trees and bushes to adorn their antlers with leaves and branches to make them look larger. At the end of the rutting season the stags and hinds will seperate. Breeding starts at 3 years of age. The young are born with spots. Hinds may be seen with this year's young and the previous year's young. Red deer will eat all kinds of vegetation - they graze and also browse on tree leaves. They are free roaming with no owners. If there is a scarcity of food the hinds can reabsorb their pregnancy. A scarcity of food will also result in more females than males being born. An abundance of food here has resulted in the Minsmere red deer being larger than the ones in Scotland. The numbers of deer are controlled with a licensed cull when necessary. We thanked Steve and Davene for their fascinating presentation and for bringing along a stag's antler for us to see and handle!

TALK BY FORMER PRISONER

On Sunday 8th October in our morning service at St Peter's Westleton we heard a challenging and inspiring talk by Sean Bradish, ex-armed robber.

Sean grew up in an abusive threatening family home, in which his life was overshadowed by the fear that his father would kill his mother. Unable to engage with education and with a very low sense of self-worth, he drifted into petty crime and had his first court appearance at the age of eleven.

Crime became his one ambition, and he rebelled against anything that represented authority. Eventually the law caught up with him and fifty cases of armed robbery earned him two life sentences, but some years into his incarceration he convinced the governing body that he was fit for release even as he was committing crimes right under their noses. He was caught again and given another life sentence.

During this time Sean's son was murdered, which hit him to the point of absolute distraction. Initially he just wanted revenge, but his sister had other ideas and asked a Christian charity, whose calling was to visit prisoners, if they could do anything for him.

What a transformation! Sean gave his life to the Lord, and with the help of therapy in prison his whole life was reframed. He studied and gained a degree, and now works as a counsellor supporting people who have lost loved ones in circumstances similar to his. *Jeremy Branch*




